



## 1. INTRODUCTION

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You have a legal right to be informed about how our school uses any personal information that we hold about you. To comply with this, we provide a 'privacy notice' to you where we are processing your personal data.

This privacy notice explains how we collect, store and use personal data about you.

We Lancaster School are the 'data controller' for the purposes of data protection law

## 2. THE PERSONAL DATA WE HOLD

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We hold some personal information about you to make sure we can help you learn and look after you at school.

For the same reasons, we get information about you from some other places too – like other schools, the local council and the government.

This information includes:

- Your contact details
- Your test/certification & awards results
- Your attendance records
- Your characteristics, like your ethnic background or any special educational needs
- Any medical conditions you have
- Details of any behaviour issues or exclusions
- Photographs
- CCTV images
- Your destination route when you move on

## 3. WHY WE USE THIS DATA

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We use this data to help run the school, including to:

- Get in touch with you and your parents when we need to
- Check how you're doing in exams and work out whether you or your teachers need any extra help
- Track how well the school as a whole is performing
- Look after your wellbeing

#### 4. OUR LEGAL BASIS FOR USING THIS DATA

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We will only collect and use your information when the law allows us to. Most often, we will use your information where:

- We need to comply with the law
- We need to use it to carry out a task in the public interest (in order to provide you with an education)

Sometimes, we may also use your personal information where:

- You, or your parents/carers have given us permission to use it in a certain way
- We need to protect your interests (or someone else's interest)

Where we have got permission to use your data, you or your parents/carers may withdraw this at any time. We will make this clear when we ask for permission, and explain how to go about withdrawing consent.

Some of the reasons listed above for collecting and using your information overlap, and there may be several grounds which mean we can use your data.

#### 5. COLLECTING THIS INFORMATION

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While in most cases you, or your parents/carers, must provide the personal information we need to collect, there are some occasions when you can choose whether or not to provide the data.

We will always tell you if it's optional. If you must provide the data, we will explain what might happen if you don't.

#### 6. HOW WE STORE THIS INFORMATION

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We keep personal information about students while they are attending our school. We may also keep it beyond their attendance at our school if this is necessary in order to comply with our legal obligations.

#### 7. DATA SHARING

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We do not share information about students with any third party without consent unless the law and our policies allow us to do so.

Where it is legally required, or necessary (and it complies with data protection law) we may share personal information about students with:

- Our local authority – to meet our legal obligations to share certain information with it, such as safeguarding concerns and exclusions
- The Department for Education- to meet our legal obligations to share certain information with it, such as safeguarding concerns and exclusions
- The pupil's family and representatives- to act in the best interest of the student and their families
- Educators and examining bodies- to award certificates and awards
- Our regulator, e.g. Ofsted- to meet our legal obligations to share certain information with it, such as safeguarding concerns and exclusions
- Suppliers and service providers – to enable them to provide the service we have contracted them for
- Financial organisations- to enable them to provide the service we have contracted them fo
- Central and local government- to enable them to provide the service we have contracted them for
- Our auditors- to enable them to provide the service we have contracted them for
- Survey and research organisations- to support national development
- Health authorities- to act in the best interest of the student and their families
- Security organisations- to enable them to provide the service we have contracted them for
- Health and social welfare organisations- to act in the best interest of the student and their families
- Professional advisers and consultants- to enable them to provide the service we have contracted them for
- Charities and voluntary organisations- to act in the best interest of the student and their families
- Police forces, courts, tribunals- to meet our legal obligations to share certain information
- Professional bodies- to enable them to provide the service we have contracted them for

## 8. NATIONAL PUPIL DATABASE

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We are required to provide information about you to the Department for Education (a government department) as part of data collections such as the school census.

Some of this information is then stored in the [National Pupil Database](#), which is managed by the Department for Education and provides evidence on how schools are performing. This, in turn, supports research.

The database is held electronically so it can easily be turned into statistics. The information it holds is collected securely from schools, local authorities, exam boards and others.

The Department for Education may share information from the database with other organisations which promote children's education or wellbeing in England. These organisations must agree to strict terms and conditions about how they will use your data.

You can also [contact the Department for Education](#) if you have any questions about the database.

Once you reach the age of 13, we are legally required to pass on certain information about you to the youth services in the local area, as it has legal responsibilities regarding the education or training of 13-19 year-olds.

This information enables it to provide youth support services, post-16 education and training services, and careers advisers.

Your parents/carers, or you once you're 16, can contact school to ask us to only pass your name, address and date of birth.

## 9. TRANSFERRING DATA INTERNATIONALLY

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Where we transfer personal data to a country or territory outside the European Economic Area, we will do so in accordance with data protection law.

## 10. YOUR RIGHTS

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### **How to access personal information we hold about you**

You can find out if we hold any personal information about you, and how we use it, by making a '**subject access request**', as long as we judge that you can properly understand your rights and what they mean.

If we do hold information about you, we will:

- Give you a description of it
- Tell you why we are holding and using it, and how long we will keep it for

- Explain where we got it from, if not from you or your parents
- Tell you who it has been, or will be, shared with
- Let you know if we are using your data to make any automated decisions (decisions being taken by a computer or machine, rather than by a person)
- Give you a copy of the information

You may also ask us to send your personal information to another organisation electronically in certain circumstances.

If you want to make a request please contact our data protection officer.

### **Your other rights over your data**

You have other rights over how your personal data is used and kept safe, including the right to:

- Say that you don't want it to be used if this would cause, or is causing, harm or distress
- Stop it being used to send you marketing materials
- Say that you don't want it used to make automated decisions (decisions made by a computer or machine, rather than by a person)
- Have it corrected, deleted or destroyed if it is wrong, or restrict our use of it
- Claim compensation if the data protection rules are broken and this harms you in some way

## **11. COMPLAINTS**

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We take any complaints about how we collect and use your personal data very seriously, so please let us know if you think we've done something wrong.
